Civil War Trust Visits California

The Civil War Trust is one of the nation's largest land trusts, buying land that has historic military value to keep it from being developed. The trust has preserved over 40,000 acres over the past 30 years (that's equivalent to 75 square miles), mostly of land that was part of a Civil War battle. They have added acreage to such important sites as Gettysburg, Antietam, Fredericksburg, among many others, and donated them to the National Park Service. Besides land preservation, the Trust does many outreach programs in education, social media, and publications. Lately the Trust has been visiting National Park Civil War sites, doing a virtual reality tour of each location. We have been fortunate that their team came to

California and wanted to visit Fort Point, Alcatraz, the National Cemetery, and Point San Jose (Fort Mason). Alcatraz Factoid (from the NPS/GGNRA website on the history of Alcatraz)

When President Lincoln suspended **the writ of habeus corpus** in 1863, the judicial system could arrest individuals and imprison them without trial in a court of law. The Union government in San Francisco now used the Alcatraz guardhouse to imprison private citizens, accused of treason, as well as soldiers. At this time, treason was broadly defined to encompass any pro-Confederate or anti-Union sentiment, from rejoicing in the Union's loss of a battle, refusing to take an oath of loyalty to the Union, or recognizing the Confederate States of America, to plotting or privateering for the Confederate cause. Many local politicians and citizens, whose loyalty to the Union was suspect, were arrested and jailed on Alcatraz to serve time. These prisoners could be detained without a trial and despite a lack of sufficient evidence of their crimes.
